

MILL MEMORIES IN ST. MARY'S COUNTY, MARYLAND By Charles E. Fenwick



Clifton Factory or the Great Mill at Great Mills, Maryland Hanover Mills, owned by the late Doctor Francis Floyd Greenwell, is the first water mill that I can vividly remember. My father would allow me to go with him to the mill quite often during the years 1914-1916. The mill, which was water powered, got its name from Hanover Farm where my father was born. While my father attended to his business, I had fun playing. Up and over the mill race, I would go to the miller's house and back to the dam and mill pond.

In Revolutionary times, and possibly before, Hanover Mills was owned by John Allen Thomas, a cavalry officer in the Revolutionary War. Before the Civil War, it was owned by my grandfather Aloysius Francis Fenwick (1817-1887). In the late eighteen hundreds, it was operated by my father Aloysius Francis Fenwick (1857-1938).

Hanover Mill became the property of my maternal grandfather, William F. Greenwell, who left it to his son and my uncle Dr. Greenwell. His family owns the site to this day, but only remnants of this old mill remain.

When I was old enough to drive our one horse wagon to the mill, my father would load the wagon at home and send me on the way to the mill. I well remember one hot Saturday about 1919 when Papa sent me to the "Factory" at Great Mills with a load of grain. He gave me instructions how to back the wagon up to the mill platform, where I was to ask Mr. John Cecil to unload it, because I was too small to do that. Then I was to tie Pet, the horse, and wait until the grain was ground and tolled. I did as instructed and when the flour middlings and bran were ready, Mr. Cecil reloaded the wagon.

Off I started for home with a full load but alas, about 200 feet from the mill my horse and wagon came apart. I asked for help but no one took me seriously, so no one helped me. There I sat uncoupled and dejected.

Much later (it seemed to me) Mr. Mills Heard came by and stopped. Seeing my concern, he said, "Son, what is the trouble?"

"My wagon has come uncoupled! I replied.

"Don't worry son!" Mr. Heard said, "the fifth wheel has come apart. All you need is a bolt."

As he went to Mr. Cecil's store to get the bolt, I wondered how I would pay him for I didn't have a cent, but that **pr**oved unnecessary. When Mr. Heard returned with the bolt, he put it in the fifth wheel. When all was ready, he patted me on the head and sent me on my way. Needless to say, Mr. Mills Heard was my hero and friend until his death.

Mr. John Cecil's mill at Great Mills was the last mill in St. Mary's County to operate by water power.


This mill site was the location of the "Factory" or Clifton Factory as it was called after a textile mill was located there. This textile mill was one of St. Mary's County's leading manufacturing industries in the early 1800's. This mill site on the St. Mary's River was mentioned often in colonial, as well as Revolutionary times.

Mr. George Cecil, brother of John, operated a grist mill at Valley Lee. Although I never carried grain to this mill, I visited it often, while it was operated by Mr. Cecil and his son, George.

Later, my memory of mills carries me to Loveville where Mr. Fred Long started a power mill. Every Saturday, it was my chore to drive old Easter to Long's Mill to carry grain and bring back flour and feed. The flour was for my mother, but I used the feed for the horse, our chickens, and our cows.

but I used the feed for the horse, our chickens, and our cows. When Mr. Roe Cecil, son of Mr. George Cecil of Valley Lee, opened his mill near Leonardtown, it was there that I carried our grain.

The last grist mill in St. Mary's County was located at Chaptico. It was owned and operated by Mr. Aubrey Gardiner. After Mr. Gardiner's death, Mr. Frank Yowaiski owned and operated it. Wallace and Francis, his sons, operated it until it closed.

Thus ended a St. Mary's County industry that had its beginning in the earliest days of the colony Maryland. Thomas Cornwalleys started the first mill in 1634 and the Yowaiskies closed the last one in 1962.

The records of the colony and its populace reveal the many water and tide mills that were located on the numerous waterways, but a list of them has not been researched as yet.

After the Revolutionary War, when the young nation found it necessary to raise monies by taxation, a record was kept of mills that were taxed. The list included here was copied by me from the St. Mary's County Tax Assessment Record. Although no tide mills are listed, Dr. Peveril Meigs of Wayland, Massachusetts, an expert on mills, assured me that water mills and tide mills were the same in the record as both were called water mills.

MILLS IN ST. MARY'S COUNTY IN THE MEMORY OF ROBERT E. POGUE

MILL CREEK: A tide mill, Seventh District, between Brambley and Chickahominy. Date and owner unknown.

BUSHWOOD WHARF: A steam-powered flour mill owned by Truman C. Slingluff. Built about 1900. Last operator, Frank Hayden. A large three story building similar to Gardiner's Mill at Chaptico. Torn down about 1945.

<u>MILESTONE</u>: A water mill on Tomakokin Run, now called Mill Run. Date and owner unknown. Millrace can still be seen. Millstone now on Burch's farm at Milestown.

CHARLES COUNTY

WICOMICO: About three miles above Budd's Creek at Wicomico is located Wicomico Flour and Feed Mill. This mill has been run for many years by the Long Brothers and continues in operation, grinding both wheat and corn. It is believed to be the only mill still in operation in Southern Maryland.

EDITOR'S NOTES

Like Charlie Fenwick, as a boy the Editor too was sent to the Cecil Mill outside of Leonardtown for flour and cornmeal. It was a long drive of some 12 miles by horse and buggy from our home on Canoe Neck, and sometimes I wondered if old "Dandy" would make it up Hilltop Hill on the return trip. We also went to the Slingluff Mill at Bushwood Wharf, using horse and wagon to haul the corn and wheat to be ground. In earlier years however, Papa sailed his "dory" Defender across the Potomac where he bought flour and cornmeal at the mill at Stratford, the birthplace of General Robert E. Lee.

It seems to the Editor that it would be fitting if the St. Mary's County Historical Society could acquire an old mill like the Gardiner-Yowaiski Mill at Chaptico which is still equipped. In addition to preserving one of our old mills, it would also provide ample space to house the Aloysius Fenwick collection of old tools and other items of that era. The Editor has been approached also by several people who have said they would like to donate old farm equipment and tools if the Society had housing for such items. There seems to be some real and enthusiastic support for a museum of this sort.
